RE: 7-point scales

The following tables compare basic results from 7-point scale administrations of identical items in Traugott's June 1980 national telephone survey and in the CPS 1980 C-1 study conducted in April.

The C-1 study used personal interviews and visual aids. The reported C-1 frequencies are for the entire sample including households with no telephones which would be unrepresented in Traugott's study. The C-1 sample is self-weighting.

Traugott's sample has a weight variable that corrects for: 1) oversampling of Republicans, 2) probability of respondent selection (based on # of eligible adults in household), and 3) probability of household selection (based on # of telephone lines in the housing unit). The procedure used to administer the 7-point scales over the telephone is documented in the attached Xeroxed pages from that questionnaire. Basically, little if any wording or structural changes were made compared to the text used in C-1 for those same questions.

The sample sizes are comparable:

C-1 = 965 respondents

Traugott's = 688

+205 Republicans oversample

893 (unweighted) 1043 (weighted)

The relative order of administration was the same for all 7-point scales: LIB/CON followed by SERVICES/SPENDING, RUSSIA, and INFL/UNEMPL. C-1 respondents had more scales to contend with, however. By the time these respondents got to answer the SERV/SPEND scale (the first for Traugott's participants), C-1 respondents had already run through DEFENSE SPENDING and AID TO MINORITIES. Thus, C-1 respondents were a bit more experienced than the telephone subjects, and this familiarity with the format may help explain the lower MD count for the SERV/SPEND scale in the FTF interview.

On the surface, there seems to be a slight tendency for points 2 and 6 to be underrepresented (and 1 and 7 overrepresented) in the telephone data, but the differences with the personal interviews in this respect are small. (The tendency for somewhat greater variance on scales administered over the telephone has been noticed before.)

No consistent conclusions can be drawn from the pattern of "HAVEN'T THOUGHT" and DK. For example, the telephone interview does not yield a consistently higher lever of MD.

The scale most affected by mode is the INFL/UNEMP. Both MD level and distributions are impacted. Since the text on the telephone administration emphasized 'inflation' or 'unemployment' rather than harping on the unpalatable trade-off as the visual aid did, it is conceivable that the telephone question became a question different from the FTF question in the course of administration and probing.

Based on this evidence, it would appear that the rough 'give me a number' approach may work as well as (or better than) any other telephone adaptation. If the goal is comparability with the FTF data. This does not address the issue of unfolding as a better or more discriminating technique for both the FTF and the telephone modes. Also, we do not know whether adding placements of parties and candidates will strain the 'give me a number' technique on the telephone which, apparently, works OK when only R's placement is desired.





Where would you place yourself on this scale, or haven't you thought much about this?





Where would you place yourself on this scale, or haven't you thought much about this?








