# Technical Report #45 Panel Attrition Among the 1990-1992 Panel Respondents

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#### Introduction

The 1992 National Election Study was comprised of two components: 1) a fresh cross-section of 1,126 respondents randomly selected from the citizen, voting-age population and 2) a randomly selected subset of 1,359 respondents first interviewed in the 1990 National Election Study.

Although 2,000 individuals took part in the 1990 National Election Study, budget constraints did not permit us to empanel all 2,000 respondents. Accordingly, 211 respondents were randomly assigned to replicates that were not released as part of the 1992 sample. Another 20 cases were subsequently deleted from the 1990 dataset because they were discovered either to be non-citizens or contained faked data. Thus, a total of 1,769 respondents to the 1990 Election Study were eligible to be reinterviewed in 1992.

Of these 1,769 respondents, 1,359 (76.8 percent) were successfully reinterviewed in the 1992 Pre-Election study (99 of these cases did not give us a Post-election interview in 1992). Of the 410 respondents who were not reinterviewed in 1992, 55.6 percent refused to be reinterviewed, 22.0 percent could not be located in 1992, 6.1 percent died between 1990 and 1992, and 16.3 percent were not reinterviewed for other reasons, including precarious health, their absence from home during the entire field period, or unavailability of a Spanish speaking interviewer.

Extensive tracking of respondents was carried out subsequent to the 1990 interviewing and the start of the 1992 field period. There were four separate mailings to respondents, with address corrections added to the recontact files. Once in the field, interviewers exercised a wide range of tracking and finding strategies to locate respondents. That we lost only 90 respondents is testament to the field staff's skill and dedication.

Because respondents move, and because their moves frequently take them out of our sampling areas, and out-of-range (for any reasonable cost) of SRC field interviewers, NES also prepared a shortened version of the '92 questionnaires, that were administered over the telephone.

In the tables that follow, we describe the correlates of the likelihood of a 1990 NES respondent being successfully reinterviewed two years later. We examine 5 sets of variables: demographic characteristics of the respondents; characteristics of respondents that would affect their recontactibility; indicators of the respondent's reluctance to be interviewed; political interest, information, and engagement; and political opinions and preferences. All variables are measured in 1990. The percentages in each table are the percentage of the 1990 respondents who were successfully reinterviewed in the 1992 Pre-Election Study. Tables marked with an asterisk display percentage differences that are significant at prob < .05.

These tables were produced from the NES 1990-1992 Full Panel Survey datafile (ICPSR #6230). A filter was used to exclude 1990 cases that were never sent to the field (N=211; V3023=0).
