ANES 2006 PILOT REPORT: ESCHATOLOGY ITEMS

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
Surveys over the past decade have provided substantial evidence that a "God Gap" is widening among American citizens, such that the political differences between those who are strict in their religious faith and those who hold no specific faith are quite large and predictable (Olson and Green, 2006). Those who are strict in their faith are considerably more likely to identify with the Republican Party and hold conservative attitudes on social issues. Quite the opposite is true for secular Americans, in that they are significantly more likely to identify with the Democratic Party.

The NES currently asks respondents a series of questions regarding their religious practice (praying and attending services), as well as their denominational affiliation. However, the NES currently only includes one question regarding the specific religious belief of its respondents. This question – regarding the inerrancy of the Bible – helps to categorize Protestant respondents. However, the inclusion of more questions of this nature would be beneficial to the scholarly community in order to better understand and identify the "God Gap."

Thus, we proposed questions regarding the end-time beliefs of its respondents to be included in the 2006 NEST Pilot. While these questions do not explicitly measure Christian eschatology, we think it can adequately tap into those beliefs. Specifically, the following two questions were presented to respondents:

Mod29_1 - When you think about the possibility of your own death, how upsetting is that?


